Benefits of group work

Seven benefits of group work 1-4



1 Two heads are better than one. You can pool ideas, share the workload and examine problems from a **range of different perspectives**, tackling more complex problems than you could working alone



2 Group projects develop valuable **workplace skills** such as organisation, leadership, cooperation, delegation - and effective communication



3 You'll meet people. Working in groups provides opportunities for you to get to know other learners on your course and to develop and **strengthen your social network**



4 You'll learn to **work in different ways**, finding different approaches to solving problems and overcoming challenges. Interactions with others help you to construct new knowledge and to refine and assess what you know, through feedback, discussion and knowledge acquisition

Seven benefits of group work 5-7



5 Group work is a powerful learning experience which develops your higher-order problem-solving and reasoning and **critical thinking skills**



6 Working in diverse teams develops your **intercultural competence and communication** skills - meaning that you can work effectively across cultures - an essential skill for living and working in the globalised world



7 It's **fun!** Long gone are the days when learning at university meant sitting in a lecture theatre listening passively to a teacher-centred lecture. Group work allows you to work with others, using hands-on, practical, collaborative approaches



Don't forget the basics – classroom and group dynamics

Getting ready for group work

Use icebreakers and warmers, so they get to know each other before any group work starts

Talk with your class about how groups function

Bring in students from the previous year to share their team-working top tips

Provide opportunities for students to discuss, negotiate, improve their listening skills and practise giving feedback to each other

Invite guest speakers, employers and alumni to talk about the skills they value

Provide support by having timetabled sessions /seminars in which they are allocated specific time or tasks to work as a group

Share (and explain) the assessment criteria!

Task Design (getting the most out of group work)

The best group work tasks are those where:

- everyone in the group is able to contribute meaningfully
- these contributions can be easily identified (and possibly logged or recorded)
- (If assessed) the assessment process is clear and transparent
- the task is well-designed to encourage collaboration
- multiple perspectives / a diverse knowledge base is needed to complete the task

- Think about roles
- Support the process, use technology effectively
- Vary how you set up the groups
- Include low stakes/ risk free opportunities for practice and rehearsal
- Provide formative feedback
- Build in opportunities for reflection

Monitoring and supporting groups

- In fact - you may find that groups will need help in a number of areas, including:
 - Group bonding
 - Setting ground rules
 - Clarifying the task
 - Managing and recording meetings
 - Encouraging effective intra-group communication
 - Dividing up tasks
 - Managing non-contribution
 - Monitoring their progress
 - Giving feedback to peers
